## **Completion Requirements**

In order to complete the program of study at the Graduate School of Public Policy (GraSPP), you must be enrolled for <u>two years or longer and earn 46 course credits or more.</u> In addition, you must complete the required courses in your program (sub-specialization) and policy stream when applicable, and earn credits for them.

You may include up to eight credits earned for courses taken at the University of Tokyo's any other graduate schools or the Interfaculty Initiative in Information Studies, or faculties when calculating the required credits for completion of the GraSPP degree.

You cannot register more than 38 credits of courses in one academic year. This includes credits for Research Paper, Thesis, and/or Internship as well. Please refer to the University of Tokyo Rules for the Graduate School of Public Policy in regards to credits obtained at another graduate school or obtained before admission to the Graduate School.

Take note that you basically cannot register for courses which have the same name as the courses for which you have already earned credits for.

Program-specific completion requirements:

- X A module which meets more than one completion requirement will be counted as meeting all relevant completion requirements.
- X Take note that if a course is not listed in the Class Subject List, it is not held in this academic year.
