Admissions Information for POSCO Asia Fellowship at GSIS SNU

The POSCO Asia Fellowship is a scholarship program designed to invite promising Asian graduate students to the Master's Program at the Graduate School of International Studies(GSIS), Seoul National University(SNU), supporting their studies at one of the most prestigious institutions of higher learning in Korea. The fellowship, offered by the POSCO TJ Park Foundation, covers full tuitions for up to 4 semesters at GSIS-SNU and monthly living stipends for two years in Korea.

A total of 9 fellowships for this year have been awarded to students from Asia. The POSCO Asia Fellowship Foundation has continued to expand the scope of its social contributions and hopes to provide additional Asian countries with more scholarships in the future. For the Master's program at GSIS SNU AY 2008, Asian universities are invited to recommend students to the Fellowship.

Fellowships are provided to promote mutual understanding between Asian countries and Korea, and to strengthen professional abilities of Asian elite students. Knowledge sharing projects such as the POSCO Asia Fellowship hope to benefit the different societies, economies, and cultures of the world.

Please note that the POSCO Asia Fellowship program only provides tuition and monthly stipend. The program is NOT responsible for other additional spending such as dormitory, travel expenses, visa fee, books, etc. You must be able to manage to pay such costs with the monthly stipend the Fellowship provides.

Eligibility and Requirements for Admission

- Submitted documents become the property of SNU and will not be returned to the applicants.

 Documents that are not in English or Korean must be accompanied by an English or Korean notarized translation.

 Please submit the original documents as well.
- International applicants with unusual cases and individual circumstances may be given special consideration.

Eligibility for Application

- Applicants must be an Asian National.
- Applicants must meet all of the following requirements:
- Common Requirements
 - 1) He or she holds a Bachelor's degree; 2) He or she is not a citizen of Korea; 3) His or her parents are not citizens of Korea

Required Documents

1. One completed Application Form (Form 1)

- 2. Study Plan and Personal Statement (in English, no particular format)
- 3. A letter of Recommendation (Form2) from the university the applicants are currently attending in his/her country
- 4. Official documents:
 - Official Undergraduate Studies Transcript
 - Notarized Certificate of a Bachelor's Degree
 - Undergraduate School Graduation Certificate
- 5. A copy of the applicant's passport (or other official document indicating your nationality)
- 6. Copies of both parents' passports (or other official documents indicating parents' nationality)
- Official document indicating parent-child relationship between the applicant and his/her parents
- 8. TOEFL score report
- 9. Optional materials
 - Certificates of relevant work experiences, test scores and/or other achievements

Application Instructions

Please observe the following instructions before beginning your application.

Form 1: Application Form (SNU Form1)

 Form 1 contains your personal information. Please specify your desired area of study, using Appendix of this booklet as a reference.
 Indicate the college or professional school and corresponding major.

Form 2: Recommendation (SNU Form2)

- A letter of recommendation from the university is required.
- Complete your part of this form and give it to the professor along with a stamped and addressed envelope. Be sure to give him or her adequate time to complete the forms before the application deadline. A recommendation should be sealed in an official envelope and signed across the back by the professor.

Study Plan & Personal Statement

- The Study Plan should state your academic goals and career aspirations. You may include
 questions that you hope to answer through your program of study and/or a timeline for how you
 plan to meet your objectives. It is advised that you review the requirements for the desired degree.
- This is an opportunity for you to convey information about yourself and your accomplishments that could not be adequately expressed through other portions of the application.
- Include family background, academic achievements, extracurricular commitments and accomplishments, volunteer work, employment experience, and your reasons for applying to SNU. You may even include personal interests such as music, art, sports, etc.

Transcripts, Graduation Certificates, Degree Certificates

- These documents detail your academic achievements and are required from every institution you attended in the past.
- Transcripts must provide a record of the courses you have taken in each year of study along with the final grades. If an institution cannot provide a year-by-year record, then the school official must at least provide us with a list of the disciplines you have studied (i.e. English, Biology, History, etc.) and a summary of your achievements in each.
- Please submit official transcripts issued directly by the institutions you have attended. You must also submit official evidence of the conferrals of all degrees, diplomas, or professional titles showing the date of the conferrals (month and year).

English Language Proficiency Test Scores

 Applicants must possess a superior level of English language proficiency(Recommended scores of TOEFL CBT 240 / IELTS 6.5 or above)

Admissions Process

All submitted applications and materials will be thoroughly reviewed by the GSIS SNU faculty and the Foundation(1st Round). Fellowship Candidates will then be selected and will be individually notified. Fellowship Candidates who successfully completes his/her application will enter into the 2nd Round of the process. During the 2nd Round, the Candidate must pass through the SNU admissions process. Of the students who qualify the SNU admissions process, 5 students will be granted the POSCO Asia Fellowship.

Application Timeline

Seoul National University's fall semester begins on 1 September.

Submitting Your Application

- Applicants whose forms and supporting documents are incomplete or unsatisfactory will be disqualified from the admissions process.
- 2. A high volume of connections are anticipated on the deadline; completing the application prior to the deadline is highly recommended.
- 3. Any Candidate who wants apply for SNU admission process must pay before the end of March (Exact date to be announced through http://gsis.snu.ac.kr), the SNU application fee of US \$80 or KRW 72,000 to:

Obligations

- Participation in a field trip or a round table conference twice a year prepared by the Foundation.
- Submission of a report on your activities in Korea in the third semester and a copy of your master's thesis.
- Student must maintain a GPA of 3.0 or above of 4.3 each semester to preserve scholarship eligibility.

Important Notes for All Applicants

- All documents should be in English or Korean. Documents in another language should be accompanied by a notarized English or Korean translation.
- If any of the submitted materials contain false information, admission may be rescinded.
- Original documents should be submitted. Should they be unavailable, however, copies must be authorized by the originating institution before they are submitted.
- Students whose graduations were pending at other institutions during the time of application should submit their Graduation Certificates and the Certificates of their degrees to their departments within 15 days after the first day of class after enrollment at SNU.
- Be sure to make and keep photocopies of *all* completed forms. Submitted documents become property of SNU and will not be returned to the applicants.
- Admitted students may not defer enrollment to a later semester. Students who wish to defer enrollment must reapply.
- Please note that SNU issues the Certificate of Admission for VISA application only to admitted students.
- After the admission, you must be able to maintain a GPA of 3.0 out of 4.3. The students unable to maintain the required grades may not be entitled to the fellowship and in worst case, severed from the SNU program.

GENERAL INFORMATION

GSIS SNU ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

GSIS SNU offers a course of study leading to the two-year degree of Master of International Studies (MIS), as well as a degree of Doctor of International Studies (DIS). The curriculum is based on four major divisions of study: International Commerce, International Cooperation, International Area Studies, and Korean Studies.

Most courses are taught as lecture-discussion classes or as seminars, and term papers, as well as presentations are frequently required. Lectures and class discussions are generally held in English, with the exception of courses in Korean studies, which are conducted in Korean.

<Degree Requirements>

To fulfill the requirements for the MIS degree, students must:

- *A minimum of 45 credits is required
- ** All major courses are categorized as either theory or practical courses

1) Pass the 4 required general courses

- * Required courses for International Commerce, International Cooperation and International Area Majors:
- Understanding International Economic Relations, Understanding International Cooperation, Research Methodology and Skills or Comparative Methodology (Select 1 out of 2 Courses)
- Contemporary World Politics: Theory and Case, Understanding the East Asia, Topics in Area Studies, International Trade Issues in Comparative Perspective (Select 1 out of 4 Courses)
- * Korean Studies Majors
- Korean Students: Understanding International Economic Relations, Understanding International Cooperation, Modern Korean History and Society, and Research Methodology and Skills (4 courses)
- Foreign Students: Introduction Korean Studies, Korean History 2 and Korean Society (3 courses)

2) Pass at least 6 courses from their major program

(Minimum of 3 practical courses must be included).

3) Pass 2 elective courses

(1 practical course must be included).

* Foreign students in Korean Studies should take 5 elective courses.

4) Pass 2 courses from other GSIS major programs

(1 practical course must be included).

- 5) Take "Dissertation Research" for preparation of their thesis

Accommodations

Applications for accommodation should be directed to the relevant dormitory office during the student selection period. Applicants should apply online at the Gwanak-sa homepage at http://dorm.snu.ac.kr.

Visa Issuance

If you plan to study in Korea, you have to apply for a student visa (D-2) at the Korean embassy or consulate in your country. In the case of short-term visits (less than 90 days) you can apply for a short-term visa, which cannot be extended in Korea. In order to get your student visa (D-2), you have to submit the documents required by the embassy, such as the admission letter from SNU and a certified sponsorship letter. The application procedure varies a little according to embassies or consulates, so you should check the required documents with the Korean embassy or consulate in your area first.
