

The Problem with Strategy

Governments are regularly tasked with formulating definitive strategies on everything from healthcare and defense to foreign relations and economics. But the process of devising strategy can suffer from planners' fixed focus on a target endpoint, instead of recognizing that the process is a dynamic series of stages requiring flexible action.

Professor Freedman will join UNU Rector David M. Malone to examine the demands on governments to have national strategies that provide a clear sense of direction. The discussion will consider the bureaucratic and diplomatic challenges involved in forging such strategies and the risks involved in making clear statements of intent.

The conversation will draw from Professor Freedman's acclaimed recent book, *Strategy: A History*, and examine how politicized environments can encourage the notion that strategy should be a plan leading to a clear aim, rather than a process of dealing with pressing problems, which requires adaptability and improvisation.
