Syllabus

Course Objectives

This course gives students opportunities to discuss current public policy issues with professionals in government, international organizations, businesses, NPOs, and research institutions in the United States. It has four objectives: first, to help students identify today's public policy challenges and learn how to design solutions, second to assist students in developing professional communication skills, third to encourage students to learn how to deliver their messages to professionals and the general public, and fourth to give students networking opportunities with professionals to broaden their future career potential.

Schedule

Tentatively scheduled for February-March 2023 in a virtual format

Teaching Methods

This course offers a series of discussion sessions with professionals in public policy fields in the United States under the overarching theme ("*Public Policy Challenges in the Changing Geoeconomic Landscape*"). The instructor guides students in preparing a proposal for discussion on public policy issues of their choice at their target organizations. Students lead and moderate a meeting discussion. Each student must submit a blogpost-style report[†] or reports on the chosen topics enriched by discussion during the field workshop. The course will limit the total number of students to <u>five</u> due to the nature of the method involving a series of intensive talks.

The target organizations this time are the Brookings Institution, International Monetary Fund (IMF), and the World Bank Group.
